We welcome you today

We would like to remind our visitors of the following;:

- All people are encouraged to participate in the sacred services of our Church. We hope that you will be able to worship as well as have fellowship with us. Should you wish any information about the Orthodox Faith or this parish in particular, please see the rector or any member of the church. We are able to place you on our mailing list.
- Only Orthodox Christians may receive the Eucharist (Holy Communion) in the Orthodox Church. In like manner, Orthodox Christians may not receive the sacraments in an non-Orthodox Church. While we hope that one day all Christians will find unity and be able to approach the chalice of our Lord together, we observe the teachings of the Church that the Eucharist is a gift of unity and not a means of unity.

We remind our faithful and visitors of the following guidelines concerning the Holy Sacraments in the Orthodox Church.

- Orthodox Christians are urged to receive Holy Communion frequently.
- Communicants should be at peace with others before approaching the chalice(Mt 5:23-24)
- Realize the importance of making a thorough examination of sins and transgressions against God, ourselves and others and having prayed for forgiveness before coming to Holy Communion.
- Frequent communicants should come to Holy Confession at least four times a year (during the four fasting periods of the year). and additionally when an examination of conscience reveals the necessity to do so in order to heal any sinful behavior.
- Communicants should fast from all foods and liquids from the evening before receiving Holy Communion.
- Communicants should read prayers in preparation for receiving Holy Communion.
- All Orthodox Christians must receive the sacraments at least once a year.
- Those who are late for Divine Liturgy (after the reading of the Epistle and Gospel) should not approach the chalice.
- Those who are ill or who have special physical needs are exempt from the above guidelines.
- Infants and children (up to the age of seven) who are Orthodox Christians may receive Holy Communion and are exempt from the above guidelines.

Thank you for gathering to worship with us today. Together we have glorified the One God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. May we be brought closer to one another and closer to God by following the eternal teachings of our Lord.

тим, хто часто причащається, слід приходити на святу сповідь принаймні чотири рази на рік (під час кожного із чотирьох щорічних постів);



LESSON FROM THE ACTS OF THE APOSTLES

(c.9, v. 32-42)

In those days, as Peter was traveling about among them all, he happened to visit also the saints, who resided at Lydda. There he found a man, named Aeneas, a paralytic, who had been bedridden for eight years. Peter said to him: "Aeneas, Jesus Christ has healed you. Rise and make your bed." He rose immediately. All the residents of Lydda and Sharon saw him, and they turned to the Lord.

Now, there was at Joppa a disciple named Tabitha, which means Dorcas, that is to say, Gazelle. She was entirely occupied in good works and acts of charity. But it happened at that time that she fell sick and died. So, they washed her and laid her in an upper room.

As Lydda was near Joppa, and the disciples had learned that Peter was there, they sent two men to him with the entreaty to come over without delay. So Peter arose and came with them.

On his arrival they took him to the upper room. All the widows stood around him weeping and showing him the shirts and garments, which Dorcas had made, while she was still with them.

But Peter put them all away and knelt down and prayed. Then, turning to her, he said: "Tabitha, rise." Thereupon, she opened her eyes, saw Peter, and sat up. He gave her his hand, and lifted her up. Then, calling the saints and the widows, he presented her alive to them. This miracle became known through all Joppa, and many believed in the Lord.

Мандруючи з міста до міста, Петро завітав до віруючих , які мешкали в Лидді. Там він знайшов чоловіка, на ймення Еней, який уже вісім років був немічний і прикутий до ліжка. Петро сказав йому: «Енею, Ісус Христос зцілює тебе. Підведись і сам постели собі ліжко». І той негайно підвівся. І всі мешканці Лидди й Сарона бачили його й навернулися до Господа.

В Йоппії жила Ісусова послідовниця Тавіта, з грецької Доркас, що перекладалося як «сарна». Вона завжди була готова на добрі справи й завжди давала бідним гроші. Якраз у ті дні вона захворіла й померла. Тіло її обмили й поклали в горішній кімнаті.

Лидда була біля Йоппії. Коли Ісусові послідовники в Йоппії почули, що Петро перебуває в Лидді, вони послали до нього двох чоловіків з проханням: «Прийди до нас, будь ласка, негайно». Петро зібрався й вирушив з ними. Коли він прийшов, його відвели до горішньої кімнати, та всі вдови обступили його. Вони плакали й показували йому одяг та інші речі, які Тавіта зробила своїми руками, коли ще була з ними.

Петро вислав їх із кімнати, а сам став на коліна й почав молитися. Потім, повернувшись до тіла, промовив: «Тавіто, встань!» Вона розплющила очі й, побачивши Петра, сіла. Петро подав їй руку й допоміг встати на ноги. Слідом за тим він покликав усіх віруючих та вдів і показав їм, що Тавіта жива. Це стало відомо по всій Йоппії, тож багато людей повірило у Господа.

GOSPEL ACCORDING TO SAINT JOHN

(c. 5, v. 1-15)

At that time, Jesus went up to Jerusalem. Now there is in Jerusalem by the Sheep Gate a pool, called in Hebrew Bethesda, with five porches. In these lay a crowd of invalids, blind, lame, paralyzed, waiting for the disturbance of the water.

For an angel of the Lord came down from time to time into the pool and disturbed the water. Whereupon the first man who went down into the pool after the agitation of the water recovered from whatever disease he had been afflicted with.

Now there was a man there who had been ill for thirty-eight years. Jesus saw him, and knowing that he had been lying there for a long time, said to him: "Do you want to become well?"

The sick man answered him: "Lord, I have no one to put me into the pool when the water is disturbed, and while I am on my way, someone else steps down before me." Jesus said to him: "Rise, take up your bed, and walk." At once the man was healed, he took up his bed, and walked.

Now it was the Sabbath on that day. Therefore the Jews told the man who was cured: "It is the Sabbath, it is not lawful for you to carry your bed." He answered them: "The man who healed me, told me to take up my bed and walk."

They asked him: "Who is the man who told you to take up your bed and walk?" But the man who had been cured did not know who it was, for Jesus had slipped away, as there was a crowd in that place.

Afterward Jesus came across him in the temple and said to him: "See now, you are well. Do not sin any more, otherwise something worse will happen to you." Then the man went off and reported to the Jews that it was Jesus who had healed him.

Пізніше Ісус знайшов того чоловіка у Храмі й мовив до нього: «Ось ти вже й видужав, тож не гріши більше, аби з тобою чогось гіршого не сталося». І той чоловік пішов. І він розповів юдеям, що це Ісус зцілив його.

Listening To The Least: The Myrrh-Bearing Women Fr. Michael Gillis

On the Sunday of the Myrrh-Bearing Women, it is important for us to reflect on the importance of listening to one another. Intrepid. That's the word I would use to describe the Myrrh-Bearing women. The Disciples were cowering in fear, locked behind closed doors not knowing what to do. The Myrrh Bearers, on the other hand, were out before dawn bringing to the tomb the spices that they had prepared in order to anoint the Body of Jesus. But how were they going to roll the stone away from the tomb? They didn't know, but that didn't stop them. What about the soldiers guarding the tomb? Would they hurt them? Would they help them? The Myrrh Bearers didn't know, but that didn't stop them. The Myrrh Bearers led by Mary the Theotokos and Mary Magdalen wouldn't be stopped. Before the sun had risen, they were on their way to the tomb.



And because of their intrepidness, the Myrrh Bearers are the first to learn of the Resurrection of Christ—from an Angel, no less. The Angel instructs them to "go quickly" and tell the Disciples that Jesus is risen from the dead. But on their way, Jesus Himself appears to them, telling them not to be afraid, but to go and tell the Disciples ("My Brethren") to meet Him in Galilee. Twice, once by an Angel and once by the Lord Himself, the Myrrh Bearers are told to tell the Disciples about the Resurrection and to instruct them on what to do next.

So that's what happened, but my question is why didn't Jesus first appear to the disciples themselves—they were, after all, the leaders Jesus had appointed. Why did Jesus make the leaders of His new community, the Church, listen to the Myrrh-Bearing Women first, before He revealed Himself to the Disciples directly?

I think it has something to do with the lesson Jesus was teaching His Disciples just before His arrest and Crucifixion. Remember that on the way to Jerusalem, the Disciples had been arguing about who was first. Jesus, their Master, washed their feet to teach them that the first is the servant of all. It's a hard lesson to learn, so I think Jesus is still teaching it to His Disciples after His Resurrection. Mark's Gospel tells us that even among the Myrrh bearers, Mary Magdalen, "out of whom He had cast seven demons," was the first to see the resurrected Lord: Not Mary the Theotokos, but Mary Magdalen. It seems Jesus comes first to the least.

And not only does Jesus come first to the least, but he also commissions the least to be an Apostle to the Apostles (Mary Magdalen is often referred to as the Apostle to the Apostles). This is one of the mysteries and ironies of the Christian experience. God has established a hierarchy and order, yet God often instructs and guides that hierarchy by the mouth of the least: "Out of the mouths of babes and infants." God's gifts and graces are manifest throughout the Body of the Church "as He wills," St. Paul tells us in 1 Corinthians. And you would think, or at least I would think, that if God distributes His charismatic gifts so broadly, there would be no need for a hierarchy. But that is not the case at all. We are told in the Gospel that Jesus appointed the twelve Disciples to be Apostles. Hierarchy is God's idea.


The implications for hierarchy seem to me to be obvious (any hierarchy—Church, family, business, government). If God often speaks to and through the least, leaders themselves do not have all that they need in order to lead; therefore, leaders must listen very carefully to those whom they lead. But this requires humility, the very quality Jesus was impressing on His Disciples by washing their feet, and perhaps by appearing first to the Myrrh Bearers and the Disciples being instructed by them. But humility is a quantity in short supply in most hierarchies. This drought of humility seems to at both ends and in the middle of most hierarchies. In my experience, it takes almost as much humility to speak from the bottom of a hierarchy as it does to listen from the top. It's just easier to be quiet when your near the bottom of a hierarch, it takes less intrepidtude. And at the top, it's so much easier to assume that you already know all that you need to know.

I am a pastor, which puts me near the top of the hierarchy in our local parish church. However, in the hierarchy of the Church generally, I am a mere squeak and a whisper. I hope I have done my best to speak—when I have something I believe God has given me to say—to my bishop. But what I am afraid I have not done well is listen to those whom God has sent to speak to me. As the pastor of a parish church, I too easily forget that I do not have all of the gifts and graces necessary to lead this community. I need to listen. I particularly need to listen to those who are on the edges, those who struggle the most, those who might need some extra encouragement to say anything at all. These I must listen to, for God has shown us through the Myrrh Bearers that in listening to the least, we listen to Christ.
